Student Learning Survey 2020/2021



The Provincial Student Learning Survey is unique in its scope, size and usefulness to schools. It gathers

information from parents/guardians/caregivers, teachers and students on topics related to school environment, safety, and achievement. The information is used for planning in individual schools and provides a district and provincial perspective.

Early in **2021** the Student Learning Survey will be administered to students in grades 10 and 12, their parents/guardians/caregivers, and all school staff. We encourage parents/guardians/caregivers to participate in this survey, as the results are important in identifying and celebrating current strengths, as well as determining where the school needs to focus improvement. The surveys contain standard questions for the Province – in addition, questions from the school and/or district that focus on local conditions or issues may be included.

The survey can be completed electronically and can be accessed on the Internet at <u>http://www.bced.gov.bc.ca/sat survey</u>. Any computer with an Internet connection can be used, and access to the e-survey is simple and secure. The survey can be accessed through the link with or without an anonymous logon code by selecting the school district and school name where your child attends school. Provincial, District and School Reports for previous years can be viewed at the same site under the *Results* section.

The e-survey site will be open until Friday, April 30th, 2021.

We are happy to announce that we are now able to have some students participate in extra



Enhanced COVID-19 Safety Protocols in Schools

School Medical officers noted that most school exposures in fall 2020 did not result in transmission within the school. However, some school exposures did result in additional cases, including clusters and a limited number of outbreaks. While each case was unique, a common recommended action from school medical officers was to review existing COVID-19 safety plans to ensure required measures were in place and were

being consistently implemented.

Additional Steps Taken

- 1. Prevent crowding and gathering.
- 2. Avoid close face-to-face contact whenever possible.

3. Students are always required to wear a mask in the classroom with the exceptions of:

- Sitting in (or standing at) their desk/workstation in a classroom or learning . space
- There is a barrier in place .
- Eating and drinking
- Outdoors

4. When eating or drinking in the building, maintain a 2m distance from others and once finished, put a mask back on.

5. Continue to wash hands and/or use hand sanitizer before and after classes and breaks.

6. High intensity physical activity should occur outside whenever possible.

PLEASE AVOID LARGE GATHERINGS AFTER SCHOOL HOURS

Students are strongly encouraged to leave the school grounds and return home as soon as school is out for the day.




KEY SPEAKER: JORDAN BUNA
